THE PURPOSE OF THE SUBJECT, LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Written language: by completing the course, students will be able to distinguish between the three writing sysems of the Japanese language: hiragana, katakana, kanji. They will be able to fluently read and write hiragana and katakana as well as read some basic kanji (hand writing is optional and not a requirement when taking the language exam). They will aquire the skills to analyse and understand the structure of kanji thus they will be able to memorize them more efficiently. They will be able to find the relevant information in numerous real life situations (travelling, shopping, eating out etc.)

Spoken language: students will be able to talk about themselves and their surroundings as well as ask questions that lead to further development when communicating with native speakers. They will be able to understand very simple sentences and interact in a simple way in everyday topics provided the other person is prepared to repeat or rephrase things at a slower rate of speech and help them formulate what they are trying to say.

Others: students will master the basic unwritten rules, manners and nonverbal communication to make them feel

confident among Japanese people. They will be able to behave appropriately when visiting someone's home or office in Japan, including body language and necessary phrases. They will be open to observe and learn new values and ways of social behaviour.

SUMMARY OF THE CONTENT OF THE SUBJECT

Language skills:

Hiragana, katakana, greetings, self introduction, countries and nationalities, family, getting around town, objects around us, counters, time expressions, schedule, basic kanji. Others: getting to know the main values and ways of thinking in Japan as well as customs and holidays. Sharing knowledge with each other from various fields including society, history, arts etc.

Students will be given a chance to discuss present social issues and do research to get a more comprehensive picture of Japan.

STUDENT'S TASKS AND PLANNED LEARNING ACTIVITIES:

Students will participate in random pair- and group work as well as role play. They will have numerous chances to exchange their previous knowledge and discuss cultural differences, history, actual news etc. They will be encouraged to regularly bring quiz questions for the class about Japan of any topic that will be taken into consideration when grading. They will have the opportunity to see / touch / taste / real objects from Japan that will expand their overall knowledge and raise their interest. They will regularly practice listening





comprehension and depending on their level they will be given the chance to talk to real Japanese people via zoom to challenge their speaking skills (1st or 2nd semester). They will encounter authentic Japanese texts of different origin (books, manga, wrappings, calligraphy,

school books, restaurant menu etc.) in order to get used to different writing styles. Students will be given regular writing practice to give them confidence in writing hiragana and katakana.

EVALUATION OF THE SUBJECT:

The course has a sharp focus on diagnosis and the continual tracking of the improvement of skills with a view to explore students' previous knowledge, interests and needs with the help of

various oral and written exercises. Within the framework of individual, pair and group evaluation, (self) checking and error recognition, students receive continuous feedback for their completion of oral and written exercises in and outside the course, which enables the assessment of the continuous improvement of the four language skills.

Evaluation criterial of written exercises:

- appropriateness (choosing the correct writing system)
- vocabulary
- grammar (fill in the gaps)
- submitting/presenting homework in time

Evaluation criteria of oral exercises:

- will to communicate
- accurate vocabulary
- coherence, fluency
- adequacy, quantity
- participation in class
- voluntary tasks

The exact development of the four skills will be evaluated in the framework of progress tests and vocabulary tests. Grading is as follows:

0-59% - fail

60-69% - pass

70-79% - satisfactory

80-89% - good

90% - excellent

The grade at the end of the semester will be composed of the average of the grades of the progress tests, presentation and an oral exam. It can be modified by the quantity and quality of

participation in class work, observation of deadlines and individual tasks. In case of noncompletion of any criterion requirement the course ends in a "fail" grade.
