THE PURPOSE OF THE SUBJECT, LEARNING OUTCOMES:

This course introduces students to the field of Sociology. The course departs from the classical theoretical traditions of Marx, Durkheim, and Weber, as well as their contemporary representatives. Readings include prominent empirical investigations into family dynamics, class inequalities, organizations, democracy, and globalization. We examine common-sense assumptions about culture, politics, history, and psychology.

SUMMARY OF THE CONTENT OF THE SUBJECT

Throughout the semester we'll be analyzing, discussing key questions such as: What is society? How can we understand it? What is the role of the individual in society, and how does society affect individual lives? The course introduces major concepts, theories, scholars, subfields, and research results of this very rich and diverse social science discipline. By emphasizing reading, writing, and critical thinking skills, this course helps students build the foundation for a deeper understanding of theory and methods in the social sciences.

STUDENT'S TASKS AND PLANNED LEARNING ACTIVITIES:

The assessment will target knowledge and understanding, application, and basic analysis and evaluation. The objectives of this assessment are to assess:

- basic knowledge of sociological theory and concepts;
- logical and coherent arguments based on sociological theory and knowledge;
- ability to apply knowledge of sociology to a range of issues and real-life contexts;
- ability to present arguments and draw conclusions based on sociological knowledge;
- ability of make basic connections between different topics outlined in the thematic
 areas.
